Food & Water

- Purified Primo Water
- Non-Perishable Food
- Shelf Stable Snacks

Tools & Supplies

- Primo Manual Pump
- Batteries
- Battery Powered Radio
- Back Up Chargers
- Flashlight/Candles
- Matches/Lighter
- Small Generator (w/ Gas)

First Aid

- Band-aids
- Antibacterial Ointment
- Medications
- Tweezers

Personal Items

- Driver's License/ID
- Family Documents
- Copies of Prescriptions
- Insurance Information

How Much Water Do You Need?

1 Gallon of Water Per Person Per Day
 Bring one (1) 5-Gallon Primo water bottle per person!
 Don't forget the Driven Manual Drip!

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BELFOR'S HURRICANE GLOSSARY

Storm Surge
 an abnormal rise of sea levels due to a storm

Storm Tide
 a rising of water levels due to the combination of storm surge & normal tide

1 Tropical Depression
 a tropical system with a maximum sustained surface wind of 39 mph or less

2 Tropical Storm
 a tropical system with a maximum sustained surface wind of 39 to 75 mph

3 Hurricane
 a tropical system with a maximum sustained surface wind of 76 mph or greater

Eye
 the (relatively) calm center of a hurricane, ranging from 3-40 miles wide

Eye Wall
 a wall of thunderstorms that surrounds the eye of the hurricane

PETS + HEAT = Danger!
 (Heatstroke can kill your pet)

Temperature might feel fine to humans, BUT often is too HOT for us.

More vulnerable to Heatstroke
 Flat-faced • Short muzzled • Seniors • Puppies • Sick • Heart & lung issues • Overweight • Black/Dark coat • Thick coat

Do NOT leave pets in car—even on a mild day—cracking windows & parking in shade do NOT help. Do NOT walk pets in the heat. Paws BURN on hot surfaces. Do NOT leave pets outside in the heat.

Animals don't sweat like humans, so they can't cool down EASILY or FAST. Keep pets safe. Keep them out of the heat!
